That is a rare and true gift. Thank you for letting me be a part of the family.

Older But Still Getting Wiser

Older But Still Getting Wiser has been a hit this session and we plan to keep right on going into the Winter. We are thrilled to have Brandt Ross returning to offer four classes in February. He will discuss "The Erie Canal, Kit Carson, The Dust Bowl and Andrew Jackson, bringing his very own style to a discussion of history, including contemporaneous folk music. Dr. Lois Ricci will be with us this session, talking about issues of aging and Lifelong Communities. We will have a session to provide more information about aging in place and plan to have representatives from the Aging in Place Council. It's going to be awesome.

The Classics

Lifespan Love Stories—February 15th, 2018




For Valentines day we have two things planned. First, we would love to really have some decorations going this year. So pick up some hearts and kisses and plan to decorate your table on the 15th of February.
